

AMHERST COLLEGE

Since its founding in 1821, Amherst College has grown into what many regard as one of the premier liberal arts colleges in the nation, enrolling some 1,800 talented, energetic and diverse men and women from most of the 50 states and many other countries. Our goal is to provide them with an outstanding education in an intimate and personal setting. Students work closely with an acclaimed faculty. They take part in a community where minds are honed, ideas are freely exchanged and lifelong friendships are formed. They participate in sophisticated research, making use of state-of-the-art equipment and facilities. They are recognized, challenged and supported as individuals traveling their own distinct intellectual paths.

Amherst College occupies a 1,000-acre campus in the town of Amherst, Massachusetts. This quintessential college town in the western part of the state is within striking distance of both Boston and New York City. The academic and residential buildings stand atop a hill that offers sweeping views of the Holyoke Range and of the town of Amherst. The campus also includes extensive playing fields and athletic facilities, a wildlife sanctuary, a forest for the study of ecology and trails and uncharted areas that invite hiking and walks with friends. Architecturally, Amherst is a comfortable blend of early 19th-century New England styles and more modern designs. A few miles away are four other institutions of higher learning—Hampshire, Mount Holyoke and Smith Colleges, and the University of Massachusetts—with which Amherst engages in a number of cooperative educational programs.

The college offers the bachelor of arts degree and cooperates with the University of Massachusetts in a Five College Ph.D. program. Amherst's faculty provides an academic program of remarkable richness and diversity. There are 36 majors and some 830 courses from which to choose. Despite its intimate atmosphere and relatively small size, Amherst has the academic depth and breadth to challenge and engage all of its undergraduates.

In A Class of Their Own



Defensive backs Jimmy Fairfield-Sonn, Chris Gow and Jaymie Spears have etched their names in Amherst football history.

The back line of the Amherst stout defense features an experienced and highly talented trio of defensive backs that have started 13 games together over the past two seasons. This unit, consisting of Chris Gow, Jimmy Fairfield-Sonn and Jaymie Spears, has excelled over the course of their careers and has enabled the Purple & White to wreak havoc in the NESCAC.

Each individual boasts a different style that compliments the group exceptionally well.

The brains of the secondary: Chris Gow.

Gow - a senior co-captain and the team's starting free safety since 2014 - has been playing football since the third grade. A student of the game, his intelligence on the gridiron has played a pivotal role in Amherst's defensive success.

"He's the general," says Spears. "He coordinates everything on the field – calls out formations; strengths; gets us aligned to where we have to be; and makes sure everyone is on the same page."

A quarterback and safety in high school, Gow was also a well-decorated lacrosse player throughout his four-year career, and played basketball as a senior as well. No stranger to success, he helped guide his high school football team – St. John's School – to consecutive conference championship games during his junior and senior seasons.

He may not play quarterback offensively anymore, but his ability to dissect defenses in high school has translated well to the other side of the ball. He greatly appreciates the position and admires the way quarterbacks get their guys in the right spòts, and systematically take apart another team. He applies this approach to defense, and is characterized as the quarterback of the secondary.

"Chris is an incredibly intelligent football player," said head coach E.J. Mills. "He always gets us in the right call and possesses unbelievable instincts."

The son and younger brother of two Williams grads – both former Eph football players – has racked up 68 career tackles in 24 games played, including eight interceptions for 145 yards. In addition to his success on the field, Gow has been named to the NESCAC Fall All-Academic team all three years in which he's been eligible.

A member of the leadership team for Christian fellowship on campus, Gow also helps lead an athlete bible study and will look to fulfill a full-time Christian ministry upon graduation. On game days, he writes the verse - Nehemiah 4:14 - on his wrist for inspiration, which means 'Don't be afraid of them. Remember the Lord, who is great and awesome, and fight for your brothers.'

The lock down corner: Jaymie Spears.

A preseason All-America selection, Spears sparks fear in his opponents with his tenacity to attack the ball and shut down receivers. The very soft-spoken and humble cornerback isn't one to laud his preseason accolade, but he and his teammates have noticed the impact of the honor.

"Teams don't throw the ball towards Jaymie much," says Gow, while Fairfield-Sonn compares it to the 'Revis Effect' – named after NFL All-Pro cornerback Darrelle Revis – who shuts down nearly ever wide receiver he covers.

That ability to take away the opposing team's top wide receiver frees up opportunities for Fairfield-Sonn and Gow, and the rest of the Amherst defense, and allows them to take risks.

A First Team All-NESCAC selection as a junior, Spears finished the season with six interceptions – tied for second most in the conference – and eight break-ups – tied for the league-high. Having made an immediate impact since joining the Purple & White in the fall of 2012, he has seen action in all 30 games thus far, and has accumulated 11 interceptions for 227 yards, 20 break-ups, two blocked field goals and 113 tackles (89 solo).

Like Gow, Spears also has NESCAC family ties. His younger brother – John Spears – is a first-

year wide receiver for Trinity. Having played for different high schools that didn't compete against each other, Jaymie and John have an opportunity to square up on the field for the first time today.

The physical strong safety: Jimmy Fairfield-Sonn.

Fairfield-Sonn – the team's starting strong safety since the 2013 season – prides himself on his physical play. He'll watch NFL safeties like the late Sean Taylor of the Washington Redskins or Tyrann Mathieu of the Arizona Cardinals, and hope to emulate their fearless and determined style of play.

Growing up an avid basketball fan, his true love transitioned to football during his freshman year at Old Lyme High School. It was there that the 5-10, Connecticut native blossomed into an exceptional safety, and quarterback, as his play helped guide the Wildcats to their first-ever playoff appearance in 2010. The team later reached the state semifinals in both his junior and senior seasons.

Fairfield-Sonn has shined during his four-year career donning the Purple & White. Having played in 21 games to date, the senior defensive back has been one of the team's most consistent and prolific tacklers in each of the past three seasons. In his first year seeing game action, Fairfield-Sonn racked up 53 tackles (43 solo); and for his career, he has 135 (92 solo) with three fumble recoveries, six interceptions, 13 break-ups and three blocked kicks. This season, he's already returned two interceptions for touchdowns.

NESCAC affiliations also run in the Fairfield-Sonn family, with a younger brother that attends Tufts University. However, Jimmy is the only football player in the family.

Together; Gow, Spears and Fairfield-Sonn have a combined 13-0 record as a starting unit, and have made their mark in Amherst football history.


"We've played so much football together – practice, games, film studies, lifts together – that at this point there's almost an unspoken connection us three have on the field, where we can disguise our coverages, and know where we are supposed to be in our responsibility, and where we are supposed to cover," said Fairfield-Sonn. "These four years together have allowed us to build this relationship and trust, so that we can not only feed off each other's energy in the

game, but also know what kind of disguises we are doing without even having to say it "

"Just being through so many games and witnessing so many things; we have a lot of experience and there's really, at this point, not much we haven't seen," adds Spears. "On top of that, being able to have football conversations immediately on the sidelines or after a play really allows us to make adjustments, and is a big part of what we do."

With two more games remaining in their collegiate careers, the trio looks to go out on top and continue to do what they do best - win.

"Coming in freshman year at Amhersi, I remember talking to Coach Mills and asking him who his greatest group of defensive backs, collectively, were," said Fairfield-Sonn. "By the time I leave Amherst, I want him to remember our class as the greatest defensive back class to ever come through here, and I want to leave our legacy in the history books."

HEAD COACH

A three-time NESCAC Coach of the Year, E.J. Mills has led Amherst to a 43-5 record and three undefeated seasons since 2009, and has solidified him-

Entering his 23rd season on the Amherst sidelines and 19th as head coach, Mills has been a part of 129 victories for the Purple & White. He came to Amherst in 1993 and served as a defensive coordinator through the 1996 season, working with former Yale head coach Jack Siedlecki to help the Jeffs improve their record in each of his four years as an assistant. When Siedlecki made his move to lead the Bulldogs, Mills was named the interim head coach for the 1997 season, and has been at the helm ever since.

self as one of the top coaches and defensive minds in the country.

The Jeffs finished 7-1 three times during Mills' first 12 seasons, but Amherst broke through in 2009 by posting its first 8-0 record since 1984, as Mills captured several postseason awards including an AFCA Division III Region 1 Coach of the Year selection. Since then, the Jeffs have gone undefected twice (2011, 2014), and have captured three more NESCAC titles to increase their total to five. In 2011, Amherst led the league in scoring offense, turnover margin, and sacks en route to 13 All-Conference selections and another NESCAC Coach of the Year honor for Mills. Last year, the Jeffs boasted one of the top defenses in the country as they led Division III in scoring defense (8.9 ppg) and ranked 15th in total defense (273.1 ypg). Amherst racked up 11 All-NESCAC selections, including another league coach of the year honor for Mills, and also received the 2014 ECAC Team of Distinction Award.

While leading the Jeffs to a 109-35 record as head coach, Mills has witnessed several of the region's best football players come through Amherst. Notably, Devin Moriarty '98 was selected by the AFCA as a Division III All-American in addition to being named the ECAC Player of the Year. Brian

Daoust '01 and Pat McGee '02 were also named All-Americans, while Fletcher Ladd '05—the school's all-time leading rusher—was the 2004 ECAC Northeast Player of the Year. Amherst has placed someone on the D3football.com All-America Team in three of the last five years, with Kevin Ferber '12 becoming the program's first-ever First Team selection in 2011.

In addition to coaching three NESCAC Offensive Players of the Year, three Defensive Players of the Year, and countless All-Conference selections, Mills has mentored some of the country's finest student-athletes and citizens. Most notable is former defensive back Paul Whiting '04, who in 2003 was the first-ever non-Division I winner of the CSTV National Student-Athlete of the Week honor. Whiting was also named the 2004 Woody Hayes National Scholar-Athlete of the Year for displaying excellence in academics, athletics and community service.

The Gridiron Club of Greater Boston has recognized several of Mills' former players. In 1995, Greg Schneider '96 took home the Nils V. "Swede" Nelson Award for outstanding achievements in academics, athletics, sportsmanship and citizenship, an award that was later earned by Ladd, Dan Guariglia '08, and Chris Tamasi '15. Tamasi was also named one of five finalists for the Coach Wooden Citizenship Cup award, becoming just the second Amherst athlete to ever earn finalist honors. Additionally, in 1997, Rich Willard '98 earned the Joe Zabilski Award as the most outstanding Division II/III offensive player in New England, while twenty Amherst players have earned CoSIDA Academic All-District honors for excellence in the classroom and on the playing field, with two also being named Academic All-Americans.

Although Mills focuses on the development of his student-athletes more than he does statistics and records, the numbers cannot be overlooked. Under his tutelage as a defensive coordinator, the 1996 Jeffs led the nation in scoring defense, allowing a miniscule 8.4 points per game. In 2001, Amherst tied a 21-year old NCAA record by not allowing a single passing touchdown, and two years later the Jeffs tied a conference record with four shutout victories. In 2009, Mills' squad led Division III in rushing defense (50.9 ypg) and finished third in scoring defense (10.4 ppg), and most recently in 2014, the Purple & White led the nation in scoring defense once again, surrendering just 8.9 points per game.

Mills is a graduate of the University of Dayton, where he was a standout baseball player before earning a degree in history and secondary education in 1988. He began coaching at Midlakes High School in Clifton Springs, N.Y., before a two-year stint mentoring the defensive secondary at the University of Albany. Immediately preceding his tenure at Amherst, Mills served as the defensive coordinator at Ramapo College in Mahwah, N.J.







Ballard has established himself as one of the best offensive line coaches around, and was promoted to offensive coordinator in 2014 after 10 seasons with the program. During his tenure with the Jeffs, Ballard most notably helped guide an offensive line group that led the nation in fewest sacks allowed in 2008 (5). The next three years were equally impressive, as Amherst surrendered the fewest sacks in the NESCAC in 2009 (8), 2010 (7) and 2011 (6). Last year, the Jeffs' line paved the way for one of the top rushing attacks in the conference once again, as it averaged 144.0 yards per game. Prior to Amherst, Ballard spent five seasons as the offensive coordinator and offensive line coach at WPI. A four-year letterwinner and 1990 graduate of the University of Albany, he began his coaching career as a graduate assistant at his alma mater, while also earning his master's degree in education.






Under Augustin's leadership, Amherst's 2009 defensive line led Division III in rushing yards allowed and sacks per game. In 2010, his special teams units led the NESCAC in kickoff coverage, touchbacks, field goal conversion rate and PAT percentage, while the 2011 and 2013 teams led the league in sacks with 28 and 22, respectively. Last year, the defensive line totaled 21 sacks to finish second in the conference, while the kicking game ranked second in both field goals made (7) and average kickoff (62.3 yards per kick). A native of Malvern, Pa., Augustin majored in psychology at Millersville University of Pennsylvania, before earning a master's degree in sports psychology from John F. Kennedy University in California. Augustin's coaching résumé also includes stints at Las Lomas High School in California, Norwich University, Mansfield University of Pennsylvania, Johns Hopkins University, and at his collegiate alma mater.

Banks joined the Amherst staff in 2011 after completing a fouryear stint as an assistant coach at his alma mater, Georgetown University. Working with the team's wide receivers, he played an integral role in helping Amherst average a league-high 29.9 ppg in his first season. At Georgetown, Banks worked primarily with the team's running backs and wide receivers, also assisting in the Hoyas' recruiting efforts. A four-year letterwinner, he recorded 84 tackles (61 solo), six interceptions and 13 pass deflections as a standout defensive back. Following graduation, the English major interned at Virginia's Potomac School before receiving his master's degree in teaching and learning from Marymount University in 2007.



Anthony Fucillo Quarterbacks Coach Recruiting Coordinator 3rd Season

Fucillo worked with Amherst's running backs in 2012 before spending the 2013 campaign at WPI as the quarterbacks coach. He returned to the Pioneer Valley a year ago and enters his second season as the Jeffs' quarterbacks coach and recruiting coordinator. A two-time captain and quarterback at NESCAC rival Tufts University, Fucillo put together a remarkable senior season, setting program records for yards (2,475), completions (215), touchdowns (16) and total offense (2,598). Receiving the 2010 Gridiron Club of Boston Gold Helmet Award for a record-breaking performance against Amherst in which he threw for 503 yards and three touchdowns, while running for two others, he graduated as the Jumbos' highest rated passer. Continuing his career overseas, he played professionally for the Aalborg 89ers of the Danish National League before returning home to serve as an assistant football coach at Stonehill College.

THE SERIES

Amherst holds a 58-43-9 edge in the all-time series, which dates back to 1886. The Purple & White have won two straight over their NESCAC rival, but Trinity has won 16 of the past 26 meetings thanks to a pair of seven-game winning streaks (1989-95, 2002-08). Amherst enjoyed a six-game win streak of its own from 1996-2001, but it's been a see-saw battle of late. However, after five straight seasons in which the home team walked away victorious, the Purple & White ended that trend last year when they edged the Bantams, 7-6, at Jessee/Miller Field. Amherst has claimed one-point wins in each of the previous two matchups, having also defeated Trinity, 17-16, in 2013 at Pratt Field.

SCOUTING AMHERST

Amherst is riding a program-record 17 game winning streak, and continues to lead the league in several categories: scoring (31.3 ppg), total offense (424.0 ypg), rushing (209.3 ypg), rushing touchdowns (14), third-down conversions (43-94), field goal percentage (87.5%), PATs (21-24), red zone percentage (88%), red zone touchdowns (14), and defensive touchdowns (2). The Purple & White also rank ninth in the country in scoring defense (10.8 ppg).

Offensively, Amherst is averaging 214.7 yards per game through the air and 209.3 on the ground. In his first season as starter, sophomore quarterback Reece Foy has done a tremendous job and is 102-of-171 for 1,288 yards passing (8 TD, 5 INT), while also rushing for 172 yards on 41 carries with three scores. Kenny Adinkra '16, Jack Hickey '19 and Nick Kelly '17 lead the rushing game with 378, 257 and 229 yards, respectively, while accounting for nine total touchdowns. The receiving core is led by Devin Boehm '17 and Jackson McGonagle '16. Boehm leads the team in catches (30) and yards (413), while McGonagle has 26 catches for 394 yards, and ranks tied for third in the NESCAC with four touchdowns. The senior co-captain also has a rushing touchdown on the season, and is one of the league's top punters having placed 14 inside the 20-yard line – second most in the NESCAC.

On the defensive side of the ball, the Purple & White are surrendering 191.3 passing and 98.8 rushing yards per game. Evan Boynton '17 and Tom Kleyn '16 lead the team with 43 tackles each, and have both been named NESCAC Defensive Player of the Week. Boynton also leads the team in sacks (4.5), followed by Isaiah Holloway '17 (2.5), Sam Caldwell '16 (2) and Jack Drew '16 (2). In the secondary, Jimmy Fairfield-Sonn '16 has two interceptions for touchdowns and six break-ups, while classmate and preseason All-America Jaymie Spears has one interception and four break-ups.

TRINITY head coach JEFF DEVANNEY

Two-time NESCAC Coach of the Year, Jeff Devanney, is in his 10th season as head football coach at Trinity College. A 1993 graduate of the College, Devanney was named Trinity's 27th head coach in December of 2005. He had been the Bantams' defensive coordinator in 2005, its special teams coordinator from 2001 to 2004, its secondary coach from 2002 to 2005 and its defensive line coach in 2001, and has continued to coach the Bantam defensive backs each fall.

Devanney has a 66-12 record as head coach that includes perfect 8-0 seasons in 2008 and 2012, which gives him the best winning percentage in the history of Trinity football at .846. The Bantams won or shared the NESCAC title from 2002 to 2005, and in 2008 and 2012. Trinity won its four home games in 2014 by a combined score of 148-57. Devanney was honored as the NESCAC Coach of the Year in 2008 and 2012, and also garnered the Gridiron Club's Division II/III New England Coach of the Year honor in 2012.

LAST MEETING

Wide receiver Jackson McGonagle '16 caught a 20-yard touchdown reception from quarterback Max Lippe '15 between two defenders with 6:43 remaining in the fourth quarter as Amherst edged Trinity on the road, 7-6. The victory marked Amherst's first road win against the Bantams since the 2000 season.

The Purple & White held Trinity to a mere 10 yards passing in a defensive battle, but only accumulated 156 yards of offense. Lippe's streak of 13 straight quarters without an interception came to an end as he tossed for 102 yards (9-for-25) with one touchdown. Wide receiver Gene Garay '15 led all players with seven receptions and 74 yards, while running back Nick Kelly '17 totaled 51 yards on 21 carries. Defensively, Amherst picked off the opposition twice, as corner back Jaymie Spears '16 recorded his fifth interception of the year and free safety Chris Gow '16 added his fourth. Inside linebacker Tom Kleyn '16 led the team with 11 tackles (6 solo), while outside linebacker Chris Tamasi '15 and strong safety Jimmy Fairfield-Sonn '16 both recovered fumbles.

Despite throwing for just 10 yards, the Bantams' top rushing attack amassed 223 yards on the ground. Leading the way was Darrien Myers with 87 yards on 11 carries, while Chudi Iregbulem was held to just 64 yards on 29 carries for an average of 2.2 ypc. Iregbulem entered the game averaging a league-high 110 yards per game with 10 touchdowns. On the defensive side, Rob Gau recorded 11 tackles (7 solo) to lead all Bantams while Nathaniel Hitchcock forced a fumble and picked it up, and Tom Szymanski registered the Bantam's lone interception.

AMHERST LAST TIME OUT

For the fourth time in six games, the Amherst College football team totaled 30-plus points as it cruised to a 32-7 win on the road against Tufts University last Saturday afternoon at Ellis Oval/Zimman Field.

The Purple & White scored the first touchdown of the game, in the first quarter, to take an early lead. Tufts evened the score in the second, but Amherst tallied 27 unanswered points en route to the decisive victory. The visitor's held an 18-10 advantage in first downs, a 170-142 edge in passing yards, and a commanding 185-19 advantage in rushing yards as it held the league's top rusher – Chance Brady – to a minimal 42 yards on 22 carries (1.9 ypc). Both teams threw an interception and lost a fumble, while Amherst claimed a slight edge in time of possession, 30:55-29:05.

The Purple & White scored three rushing touchdowns; Nick Kelly '17 (15 att, 83 yds), Kenny Adinkra '16 (13 att, 57 yds) and Reece Foy '18 (8 att, 9 yds), while Jimmy Fairfield-Sonn '16 scored the other Purple & White touchdown with a 25-yard pick-six. Foy went 18-of-27 for 170 yards and an interception, as Devin Boehm '17, Nick Widen '17 and Jackson McGonagle '16 led the team with 70, 47 and 46 receiving yards, respectively. McGonagle also punted seven times for 251 yards, while placing four inside the 20-yard line. Fairfield-Sonn led the team in tackles with nine, while Tom Kleyn '16 and Jack Drew '16 recorded seven each. Drew also registered a sack along with Evan Boynton '17 and Reid Singer '16.

TRINITY LAST TIME OUT

Trailing with 4:18 remaining in the game, Trinity came back to defeat Middlebury, 26-14, after a wild end to the Bantams' week six matchup in Vermont. Junior wide receiver Darrien Myers tallied 215 all-purpose yards including a 74-yard punt return to help keep Trinity perfect at 6-0 this season.

Quarterback Sonny Puzzo finished the day 13-of-31 with 229 passing yards, while Max Chipouras, the team's leading rusher, tallied just 45 yards on 22 attempts. Wide receiver Bryan Vieira led the team with 71 receiving yards on three catches, while receivers lan Dugger and Myers combined for seven catches and 118 yards. The Bantams amassed 262 yards of total offense with 229 through the air, and just 33 on the ground. Trinity also gained just 14 first downs, compared to 27 from Middlebury.

Defensively for the Bantams, senior linebacker Frank Leyva led all players with 13 tackles (11 solo) followed by linebacker Liam Kenneally with 11 and two sacks, and safety Patrick Dorsey with 10. Punter/kicker Kyle Pulek kept Middlebury's offense away from the Bantam defensive half by placing four punts inside the Panther 10-yard line. Trinity's defense allowed 449 yards of offense; 336 passing and 113 rushing.

AMHERST 2015 Statistical Leaders PASSING

Trinity is 6-0 entering its Week 7 matchup against Amherst, and is coming off a 26-14 come-from-behind win on the road against Middlebury (4-2). The Bantams have relied on their stingy defense, which ranks fifth in Division III in scoring, having allowed just 8.7 points per game. Trinity is 3-0 in road games this season and has outscored opponents, 94-41.

The Bantams boast the league's top defensive unit through six games, which leads the NESCAC in passing yards allowed (174.5 ypg), rushing yards allowed (89.0 ypg) and total offensive yards allowed (263.5 ypg). Trinity also has a conference-high 11 interceptions, and is tied with Amherst for first in defensive touchdowns (2). The team is led by line-backer Liam Kenneally with 45 tackles (29 solo), including three sacks and three break-ups. Linebacker Shane Libby leads the team in sacks with 3.5, and ranks second in tackles with 31, while defensive back Paul McCarthy leads all Bantam players with four interceptions.

Offensively, Trinity sits tied for first with Amherst in rushing touchdowns (14); and averages 155.8 yards per game on the ground and 240.7 yards through the air. With 396.5 yards per game of total offense, the Bantams rank fourth overall among its NESCAC counterparts. Leading the unit is first-year running back Max Chipouras with 501 rushing yards on 89 attempts (5.6 ypc). He is also tied for the league-high in rushing touchdowns with nine. Quarterback Sonny Puzzo is 93-of-171 for 1,430 yards, including five touchdowns and five interceptions, and is also third on the team in rushing yards with 113 (3 TD). His favorite targets have been Darrien Myers, Ian Dugger and Bryan Vieira with 27, 22 and 21 catches, respectively. Vieira leads the receiving corps with 542 yards and three touchdowns.

The James E. Ostendarp Bronze Plaque Memorial was revealed on Oct. 20, 2007, prior to Amherst's Homecoming game against Wesleyan University. Since then the Lord Jeffs have gathered at the "Darp Rock" on Fridays during the season, providing the captains a chance to address the team the night before each game.

Separate from his on-field successes as a coach, the Darp was crucial in the development of the academically minded student-athlete at Amherst. "The Darp stood for everything that we still preach to our players now," says E.J. Mills. "Amherst football has a great tradition of having the finest student-athletes in the country, and when you think about the overall program in this era, it is synonymous with one man: Jim Ostendarp."

"The Darp" led Amherst to a 168-91-5 record from 1959-91. He notably won 36 games and lost only four from 1961-65, with his 1964 and 1984 teams each finishing at a perfect 8-0. Engraved on his plaque—along with his picture and biographical information—is one of his most famous quotes: "Any day Amherst plays is a special day."

Amherst and the NFL

Four Amherst College alumni began successful careers in the National Football League in the 1970s, marking one of the most exciting times in the history of the school's athletic department. On Aug. 17, 2010, these four former Lord Jeffs were profiled in Seth Schwartz's USA Today feature titled, "Tiny Amherst's four NFL alums enjoy off-field success." Here is a closer look at what those four players brought to the NFL.



Doug Swift '70 was a six-year starter (1970-75) at outside linebacker for the Miami Dolphins, who won the 1972 and 1973 Super Bowls. Swift played a vital role in helping the 1972 squad finish with an unblemished record of 17-0, intercepting three passes during the regular season and another two in the opening round of the playoffs. His second INT of that game is known as one of the biggest plays in team history, as it came late in the fourth quarter and put a stop to a potentially game-winning drive. Swift played in 78 regular season games and 11 more in the postseason before retiring in 1976 to attend medical school.



Jean Fugett '72 spent four years with the Dallas Cowboys (1972-75) and another four with the Washington Redskins (1976-79). Selected by the Cowboys as a tight end in the 13th Round of the 1972 NFL Draft, Fugett caught 156 passes for 2,270 yards and 28 touchdowns in 103 regular season games. Fugett recorded at least five touchdowns in each season from 1976-78, with his 631 receiving yards and five touchdowns in 1977 earning him a Pro Bowl selection. He also played in nine postseason games, helping the Cowboys advance to the 1975 Super Bowl. During a 24-21 win over the San Francisco 49ers in 1976, Fugett caught three touchdown passes from Joe Theismann.




Freddie Scott 74 was selected by the Baltimore Colts in the 7th Round of the 1974 NFL Draft and went on to enjoy a 10-year playing career as a wide receiver. In four seasons with the Colts (1974-77) and six with the Detroit Lions (1978-83), Scott caught 262 passes for 4,270 yards and 20 touchdowns in 132 regular season games, also playing in five postseason games. During a dominant 1981 campaign with the Lions, Scott racked up 1,022 receiving yards and caught five touchdowns, putting together three of his five career 100-yard receiving games. The owner of several Amherst records, Scott was inducted into the College Football Hall of Fame in 2001.



Sean Clancy '78 spent two years in the NFL as a linebacker for the Miami Dolphins (1978) and then-St. Louis Cardinals (1979). Chosen by Miami in the 8th Round of the 1978 Draft, Clancy played in all 16 regular season games to help the Dolphins post an 11-5 record and advance to the postseason as the best team in the AFC East Division. Clancy played in 10 of the Cardinals' final 12 games the following year, but his third season in the league would be cut short after he broke his foot making a tackle during training camp. Also used on special teams, Clancy's career statistics are unknown because the NFL did not begin tracking tackles until 2001.

Also signing professional contacts were Rick Murphy '73 (Baltimore Colts), Rich Klonoski '74 (Denver Broncos), Bill Swiacki '78 (NY Giants, selected in 9th Round) and Scott Curry '95 (Oakland Raiders), but none ever played in the NFL. The first man to represent Amherst in the NFL was John Anthony Hill '26. Known as "Kid" Hill, he played in two games as an offensive tackle for the 1926 New York Giants. Offensive lineman Alex Bernstein '97 was an undrafted free agent who was a member of the Baltimore Ravens (1997), New York Jets (1998), Cleveland Browns (1999) and Atlanta Falcons (2000) before suffering a career-ending injury in the 2000-01 training camp.




which took place in the nation's capital and honors NFL players for their individual contributions to their communities, two new awards were introduced. One of these was the Union Leader Award. which honors "Devotion to the National Football League Players Association philosophy of ONE TEAM, as shown through an act of courage." Amherst's Doug Swift '70 was this year's recipient for his involvement as a player representative during labor negotiations in the early 1970s. During his playing days, he was referred to by a reporter for the Miami Herald as "the most underrated if not the

best" strong-side linebackers in the NFL. Swift is

now an anesthesiologist at Pennsylvania Hospital



Eye on Athletics

Taking the Game to the Next Level

When you enter LeFrak Gymnasium on the campus of Amherst College, it is easy to be overwhelmed by the tradition of success that is on display for those teams that call that arena home. With the purple and white banners proudly showing off numerous NESCAC and NCAA Division III national titles, it is difficult not to feel like you are a part of greatness.

For the Amherst women's basketball team, this truly is home.

"LeFrak is where we spend countless hours, in and out of season," explained Ali Doswell – a native of Richmond, Va. and a junior on the women's basketball team. "Some days we spend more time in there than in our own rooms. It has become a home for us. We take pride in calling that court our home court, not only because it's a place that is meaningful to the team we have right now, but it also represents the tradition of Amherst basketball, and the excellence that has taken place there."

Since the arrival of ninth-year head coach G.P. Gromacki during the 2007-08 season, the Purple & White have amassed an impressive, 232-22 record which includes eight 25-plus win seasons, five NESCAC titles, five NCAA Final Four appearances, and a national championship in 2010-11.

At the forefront of Gromacki's success has been the undeniable consistency of his teams.

"We expect excellence," Gromacki stated.
"We've had some great players everywhere I've
coached. From our current roster to my current assistant
[Pumla Sathula], we've always had some talent. We set
high goals; we have a group of achievers, so I've been
pretty fortunate."

Prior to his arrival in the Pioneer Valley, Gromacki was the head coach at Hamilton College for one season (2006-07) where he led Sathula and the Continentals to a 20-8 overall record. He had spent the previous six seasons at St. Lawrence University where he totaled an impressive, 143-30 ledger with the Saints. His overall head coaching record now stands at a combined 395-60, with the majority of those wins coming while at the helm of Amherst.

With five conference championships (2008, 2010, 2011, 2012, 2013), and a national crown in hand, the element of consistency once again comes into play. Since a last-second buzzer beater by visiting Bowdoin College on January 30, 2009 dealt the Purple & White a 63-61 loss on its home court, Amherst has not lost a home basketball game since.

"Playing in LeFrak really is a 'home court advantage'," explained Meredith Doswell - Ali's twin sister and current junior on the women's basketball team. "The advantage goes beyond being accustomed to shooting on our baskets with the abnormal LeFrak lighting. Coach Gromacki and his past teams have set a precedent that we defend our home court. The adrenaline and urgency that I get when I step on the court in LeFrak is something that only members of the Amherst women's basketball team have experienced."

Since joining the program two seasons ago, the Doswells and their tremendously talented teammates have continued that tradition. During their first season on the court in 2013-14, the Purple & White posted an impressive, 26-4 record which included a 13-0 mark at LeFrak. The following year, Amherst forged nearly an identical, 25-4 mark, and finished 12-0 at home.

On November 23, 2014, the Purple & White set an NCAA women's basketball record with its 100th consecutive home win, surpassing the all-time women's record of 99 established by Division I power house University of Connecticut (UConn) in 2012, following a 73-63 win over Baruch College. All that remains is the all-time NCAA home win streak of 129 games set by the University of Kentucky men's basketball program from 1943-1955.

"We never really knew about either streak until we started getting close," Gromacki explained. "All of a sudden people started reminding us 'hey you could break UConn's streak'; and we didn't really know about Kentucky's streak until we broke UConn's streak. We never really talked about it. Now I think it's in the back of our minds. It was a great honor to be mentioned in the same breath as UConn's women's basketball program when we did break that record. We were fortunate to have some lucky breaks along the way to keep the streak going. It's really just about enjoying playing at home and letting the rest take care of itself."

With a national record achieved, national attention soon followed, and the Amherst women's basketball team was featured in the sports section of the New York Times in early January.

"Honestly, we barely talk about the home win streak," Meredith stated. "But getting recognized by the New York Times was an incredible experience. The only downside is that every team that comes to LeFrak wants to beat us on our home court; to be that team that ended the Amherst women's home streak."

"It's been a crazy experience," added Ali. "Not many Division III teams get the attention that we got this past season when we broke the record. It was definitely an added pressure to the season, but Coach Gromacki does a good job making us focus on just playing the game, and not letting the distractions affect our play."

The Purple & White certainly were not adversely

impacted by the media attention, and finished the season with a NESCAC semifinal appearance, and advanced to its eighth straight NCAA Sweet 16.

With a historic season in the books, and early November practices underway for the 2015-16 season, Amherst, ranked second in the D3hoops.com Preseason Coaches Poll, once again has its sights set on a NESCAC title and a national championship.

"For this season, we expect to build upon what we have accom-

plished the past few years, make a few adjustments here and there, so that we can make it further than we have, and ultimately reach our goal," Ali commented. "We have some very challenging games that stand between us and that final goal, but I am particularly excited for those games, and the great opportunities that come with them."

One such opportunity is the chance to continue playing basketball with her twin sister.

"Playing collegiate basketball with Meredith is definitely something that I don't appreciate enough," Ali explained. "I've played on every basketball team with her since before we were eight, so it seems so normal to have her by my side. If I have a bad game and she has a good game, I feel a little better. If I have a good game and she has a bad game, I feel a little worse. I think it makes me a better team player by forcing me to think about the success of others on the team and not just focus on how I am playing."


Meredith echoed her sister's remarks and added that they have a "twin thing."

"I know where she likes her passes to shoot, and usually, I know where she is at all times on the court. Thank goodness we are different positions so we don't fight for each other's playing time! It's also nice to have a permanent rebounder when I go to the gym to shoot. But, jokes aside, she's supported me through my collegiate career and has really helped me become the player I am today."

As the seasons change and Amherst student-athletes trade volleyballs and soccer balls for basketballs and hockey pucks, the Purple & White women's basketball team is hard at work on taking its game to the next level

"The past two seasons have been great relative to all basketball programs across the nation," Meredith noted. "But we aren't like those other programs. We set ourselves to higher standards. I expect more from my teammates and myself than a Sweet 16 finish. I know we are capable of achieving more.

"We lost some good players, but I am confident in my teammates," she continued. "We have been working extremely hard this preseason to get better and stronger, and I'm excited to see who steps up. I know it's going to be a fun and great year."




The Friends of Amherst Athletics celebrate the rich history of Pratt Field and Neuhoff-Lumley Track!

A late-night fire on September 30 completely destroys the grandstand. Construction on a new, identical grandstand begins early in 1900, and is completed in time for the following football season.

Pratt Field is constructed on the site of Blake Woods thanks to a generous gift from Frederick B. Pratt, Class of 1887. The 13-acre field includes a quarter-mile track, a baseball diamond, a football field and a \$6,000 grand-stand with bathrooms and dressing rooms. The dedication ceremony on May 22, 1891 is followed by a baseball game, a 10-1 Amherst triumph over Dartmouth College.

Pratt Field's familiar iron gate entrance is added. Pictured here just after completion during the winter of 1926-27.

DeBevoise Field House is built to replace the existing field house that partially burned down the previous year. DeBevoise Field House adds home and visiting locker rooms, and the project also includes improvements to lighting on the practice fields and bleachers in the grand stand.

The eight-lane Neuhoff-Lumley Track is installed, replacing the cinder track that previously encircled Pratt Field. Prior to this addition, the track teams had to travel to Mount Holyoke College or Smith College to train and compete.

Pratt Field and Neuhoff-Lumley track underwent a historic renovation. As part of the project, the complex was re-oriented and an artificial turf surface was installed on the playing field. A new field house was also built to provide additional locker rooms, team meeting spaces, medical treatment facilities and alumni gathering areas.
